Saul D. Hoffman is Professor of Economics and Department Chair at the University of Delaware, where he has taught since 1977. He is also a Core Faculty Associate, Program in Women's Studies, University of Delaware and a Research Associate at the Population Studies Center, University of Pennsylvania.

With co-author Susan Averett (Lafayette College), he is the author of a textbook *Women and the Economy: Family, Work, and Pay*, published by Addison Wesley. With UD colleague Larry Seidman, he is the author of *Helping Working Families: The Earned Income Tax Credit*, published by the Upjohn Institute Press, 2003.
