^a President's budget proposes funding this program through the Public Health and Prevention Fund (a mandatory fund established in the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA). "Mandatory" means the funding is not subject to annual appropriations.

^b This program is not subject to annual appropriations. ACA restores the Title V Section 510 abstinence grants to states and provides \$50 million/year in mandatory funds for FY10-FY14.

^{cc} The President's budget request was released in February 2010, before the passage of ACA, where this funding was authorized and appropriated. This program is not subject to annual appropriations.

^d The President's budget request includes \$50 million for the continuation of abstinence education grants as authorized through ACA. Guidance from the Administration on Children, Youth, and Families provides additional flexibility for states in administering the program.

^e This program is not subject to annual appropriations. The President's FY 2010 budget proposed \$50 million in mandatory funds to states and tribes for evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs. ACA includes \$75 million/year in mandatory funds for the Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) to reduce teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections. This includes approximately \$50 million in formula grants would be available to states for evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs. The remaining \$25 million would be available for states and communities to fund innovative approaches to teen pregnancy prevention (particularly for working with at-risk youth), grants to tribes, and for research, training and technical assistance.

^f The President's budget requested \$50 million in mandatory funding for states and tribes for evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs. The budget was released in February 2010, before the passage of ACA, which included \$75 million/year in mandatory funding for PREP. This program is not subject to annual appropriations.

^g This program is not subject to annual appropriations. ACA provides \$25 million/year from FY 2010 to 2019 for competitive grants to states, tribes, and territories through the Pregnancy Assistance Fund provision for programs to support pregnant and parenting women and youth in high schools and community service center and at institutions of higher education. Grants also support services for victims of domestic violence, and to increase public awareness about services for pregnant and parenting women and girls.

^h The President's budget request was released in February 2010, before the passage of ACA, where this funding was authorized and appropriated. This program is not subject to annual appropriations.

ⁱ The FY 2010 conference agreement does not provide funding requested by the President and approved by the House for the Adolescent Family Life program to carry out effective teenage pregnancy *prevention* programs. It does however provide funding for “care grants” for teen parents.

^j President’s budget proposes terminating this program (which currently only includes care grants to support pregnant and parenting teens) and instead providing services through the Pregnancy Assistance Fund.

^k H.R. 1473 also applies an across-the-board cut of 0.2% which has been applied to this program, meaning an additional \$600,000 has been deducted for an exact funding level of \$299.4 million.

^l The FY 2010 conference agreement does not provide funding for the Strengthening Communities Fund. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) provided \$50 million through September 30, 2010 for this purpose.

^m Mandatory Funding for Healthy Marriage and Responsible Fatherhood grants is included in the \$17 billion for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Block Grant.

ⁿ The President’s FY 2011 budget proposed redirecting the Healthy Marriage and Responsible Fatherhood funds to a new Fatherhood, Marriage, and Families Innovation Fund.

^o President’s budget requests a one-year extension in all TANF funds, including funds for Healthy Marriage and Responsible Fatherhood grants.

^p The President’s budget proposed a Fatherhood, Marriage, and Families Innovation Fund to support States' development, implementation and evaluation of: a) comprehensive responsible fatherhood programs that rely on strong partnerships with community-based organizations; and b) comprehensive family demonstrations geared towards improving child outcomes.

^q President’s budget requests a one-year extension in all TANF funds, including funds for Healthy Marriage and Responsible Fatherhood grants

^r Funds for these grants come from the Prevention and Public Health Fund, created by the ACA.

^s The Administration requested funding for a reformed 21st Century Community Learning Centers program as part of its new Supporting Student Success initiative. The program would support centers that serve students through activities that improve their academic achievement by providing additional time for students to engage in learning and providing access to comprehensive supports that promote academic achievement as well as mental and physical health.

^t H.R. 1473 also applies an across-the-board cut of 0.2% which has been applied to this program, meaning an additional \$2.3 million has been deducted for an exact funding level of \$1.15 billion.

^u The President’s budget request for Foster Care, Adoption Assistance, Guardianship Assistance, and Independent Living programs proposes an increase of \$250 million to support a reform agenda focused on improving outcomes for children.

^v The conference agreement includes \$20 million to fund demonstration projects that aim to improve the outcomes for children and families, particularly those with long-term involvement in foster care. The demonstration program will take a multi-faceted approach to reduce the number of children who stay in foster care for extended periods of time and encourage an upfront investment in evidence-based or evidence-informed services.

^w The FY 2010 HIV/AIDS and Chronic Diseases Prevention budget lines reflect a comparability adjustment to reflect the transfer of School Health budget (\$40 million) from Chronic Diseases Prevention to Domestic HIV/AIDS in FY 2012 budget request.

^x The President's budget request reflects an increase of \$69 million above the FY 2010 level, including \$30.4 million from the ACA Prevention and Public Health Fund and a transfer of \$40 million from the Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion budget for the comprehensive school health program.

^y The President's budget request consolidates this activity into the new Comprehensive Chronic Disease Prevention Program.

^z Of the amount for School Health, in recent years \$40 million has been for HIV/Sexual Health. The FY 2012 budget proposed moving this to HIV/AIDS/STD Prevention.

^{aa} The conference agreement does not fund the President's FY10 budget request for the expansion of the CDC's safe motherhood program, which promotes evidence-based interventions for teen pregnancy prevention.

^{bb} The proposed funding for CDC Safe Motherhood Program includes \$22 million for an expansion of the "Promoting Science-Based Approaches" project, which promotes evidence-based interventions for teen pregnancy prevention. The increased funding for the PSBA project includes \$7 million over FY 2010 appropriated levels for five national groups, regional training centers, and 22 state teen pregnancy prevention coalitions.

^{cc} The FY 2012 request of \$55.7 million for Safe Motherhood reflects an increase of \$10.9 million above the FY 2010 level. A total of \$6.5 million of the increase is intended to increase support for teen pregnancy prevention activities, with a focus on evaluation.

^{dd} ACA provides \$1.5 billion in mandatory funding for the program between FY 2010 and FY 2014, with \$100 million for 2010.

^{ee} Not subject to annual appropriations. ACA provides \$350 million for FY 2012.

^{ff} The Administration requested funding for Promise Neighborhoods as part of its new Supporting Student Success initiative. Funds would support competitive grants and other activities for projects designed to significantly improve the educational and developmental outcomes of children within the Nation's most distressed communities, with the goal of transforming those communities so that all children in the community have access to a cradle-through-college-and-career continuum of academic programs and community supports, including effective schools and services.

^{gg} H.R. 1473 also applies an across-the-board cut of 0.2% which has been applied to this program, meaning an additional \$60,000 has been deducted for an exact funding level of \$29.9 million.

^{hh} The Administration requested funding for Successful, Safe, and Healthy Students as part of its Supporting Student Success initiative. Funds would support competitive grants and other activities to assist States, local educational agencies (LEAs), and partnerships between LEAs and non-profit organizations or local

government entities in improving school climate; reducing or preventing drug use, violence, or harassment; and promoting and supporting the physical and mental well-being of students so that schools are safe, healthy, and drug-free environments.

ⁱⁱ Current Title I Grants to Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) would be allocated for activities for College- and Career-Ready Students. These funds would be allocated through formula grants for programs that provide academic support to help students in high-poverty schools make progress toward the new college- and career-ready standards that states would implement.

^{jj} Of the proposed \$14.8 million, \$300 million is for financial and other rewards to high-performing Title I LEAs and schools.

^{kk} H.R. 1473 also applies an across-the-board cut of 0.2% which has been applied to this program, meaning an additional \$1.4 million has been deducted for an exact funding level of \$698.6 million.

^{ll} Race to the Top program funds were used to motivate states to reform their laws and make new plans to better support educational improvement and innovation. New funding would support awards to additional states and open the Race to the Top competition to school districts, allowing them to compete directly, with a particular focus on cost-effective reforms that improve student achievement.

^{mmm} The Department of Education renamed the School Improvement Grant program to the School Turnaround Program for the FY 2011 budget.

ⁿⁿ H.R. 1473 also applies an across-the-board cut of 0.2% which has been applied to this program, meaning an additional \$976,066 has been deducted for an exact funding level of \$349.3 million.

^{oo} The Young Parent Employment Training Demonstration was funded under the XXXX and has expired.

^{pp} Of the \$108 million provided in the FY 2010 conference agreement, \$15 million is dedicated to transitional jobs activities as noted above in the Transitional Jobs program.

^{qq} As provided under the Workforce Investment Act and the Second Chance Act of 2007, \$20 million of the \$90 million would be for competitive grants to national and regional intermediaries for activities that prepare young ex-offenders and school dropouts for employment, with a priority for projects serving high-crime, high-poverty areas.

^{rr} The House-passed version of the Student Aid and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 2009 includes a total of \$3 billion in mandatory funds over 5 years (\$600 million/year from FY 2010 to FY 2014) for this program. However, this was not included in the Health Care and Education Affordability Reconciliation Act of 2010, although this Act did include \$2 billion (\$500 million/year over four years) for a Community College and Career Training Grant program through the Department of Labor (see below).

^{ss} The President's budget requested \$700 million for FY 2011 (\$3.5 billion over 7 years) for a College Access and Completion Fund, which would make grants to States, institutions of higher education, and other organizations to support innovative strategies to increase the number and percentage of students entering and completing college.

^{tt} Although H.R. 1473 did not include funding for the College Access and Completion Fund, it did include \$150 million in funding for the College Access Challenge Grant Program. This program, which was first funded in 2008 as part of the Higher Education Act, was incorporated into the President's College Access and Completion Fund with the purpose of fostering partnerships among federal, state, and local governments and philanthropic organizations through grants aimed at increasing the number of low-income students who are prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education.

^{uu} President's budget requests \$150 million for "First in the World" competition, an initiative to increase college access and completion and improve educational productivity through a new evidence-based grant program. The proposal introduces an evidence-based framework into the Fund for Improvement of Postsecondary Education, allowing the Fund to become a postsecondary "Investing in Innovation" program to test, validate, and scale up effective approaches.

^{vv} Not subject to annual appropriations. The House-passed version of the Student Aid and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 2009 includes a total of \$7 billion in mandatory funds over 10 years (\$730 million for each of the fiscal years 2010 through 2013, and \$680 million for each of the fiscal years 2014 through 2019) for this program. This was not included in the Health Care and Education Affordability Reconciliation Act of 2010, although this Act did include \$2 billion (\$500 million each year over four years) for a Community College and Career Training Grant program through the Department of Labor.

^{ww} The President's budget requested \$2.5 billion for FY 2011 (\$10.6 billion over 10 years) for the American Graduation Initiative in the Department of Education to strengthen and support community colleges, focus on college completion and graduate 5 million more students by 2020. This was not included in the Health Care and Education Affordability Reconciliation Act of 2010, although this Act did include \$2 billion (\$500 million each year over four years) in mandatory funds for a Community College and Career Training Grant program through the Trade Adjustment Act in the Department of Labor.

^{xx} Not subject to annual appropriations. This represents mandatory funding included in the Health Care and Education Affordability Reconciliation Act of 2010 for FY 2011-FY2014.
