^a President's budget proposes funding this program through the Public Health and Prevention Fund (a mandatory fund established in the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA). "Mandatory" means the funding is not subject to annual appropriations.

^b With the across the board cut of 0.189% factored in, the exact final funding level for the Teenage Pregnancy Prevention Program for FY 12 is \$104.6 million.

^c This program is not subject to annual appropriations. ACA restores the Title V Section 510 abstinence grants to states and provides \$50 million/year in mandatory funds for FY10-FY14.

^d The President's budget request includes \$50 million for the continuation of abstinence education grants appropriated through ACA. Guidance from the Administration on Children, Youth, and Families provides additional flexibility for states in administering the program.

^e Community Based Abstinence Education (CBAE) grants were funded at \$95 million in FY 2009 and at similar levels in prior years. Funding was eliminated in FY 2010 and the evidence-based Teenage Pregnancy Prevention Program was created instead. The FY 2012 appropriations bill provides \$5 million for competitive grants for abstinence education. Similar to the old CBAE grants, the new funding uses the A-H definition of abstinence in the Title V grants and does not have any requirements about evidence or evaluation.

^f This program is not subject to annual appropriations. The President's FY 2010 budget proposed \$50 million in mandatory funds to states and tribes for evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs. ACA includes \$75 million/year in mandatory funds for the Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) to reduce teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections. This includes \$55 million in formula grants for states who choose to apply for evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs. The remaining \$20 million is for states and communities to fund innovative approaches to teen pregnancy prevention (particularly for working with at-risk youth), grants to tribes, and for research, training and technical assistance.

^g This program is not subject to annual appropriations. ACA provides \$25 million/year from FY 2010 to 2019 for competitive grants to states, tribes, and territories through the Pregnancy Assistance Fund provision for programs to support pregnant and parenting women and youth in high schools and community service center and at institutions of higher education. Grants also support services for victims of domestic violence, and to increase public awareness about services for pregnant and parenting women and girls.

^h The FY 2010 conference agreement does not provide funding requested by the President and approved by the House for the Adolescent Family Life program to carry out effective teenage pregnancy *prevention* programs. It does however provide funding for "care grants" to support pregnant and parenting teens .

ⁱ President's budget proposes terminating this program (which currently only includes care grants) and instead providing services through the Pregnancy Assistance Fund.

^j With the across the board cut of 0.189% factored in, the exact final funding level for the Title X Family Planning Program is \$296.8 million.

^k TANF includes state family assistance grants states and territories, matching grants to territories, supplemental grants for population increases, and tribal work programs. This does not include funds for the contingency fund.

^l TANF is currently operating on a temporary extension that expires on February 29, 2012.

^m The Healthy Marriage and Responsible Fatherhood grants are currently operating on a temporary extension that expires on February 29, 2012.

ⁿ The 0.2% across the board discretionary cut applies to the discretionary portion of these funds but not to the mandatory funds that come from the ACA.

^o The 0.189% across the board discretionary cut applies to the discretionary portion of these funds but not to the mandatory funds that come from the ACA.

^p Funds for these grants come from the Prevention and Public Health Fund, created by the ACA.

^q Funding for these grants comes from the ACA. The increase in funding will be directed towards chronic disease prevention.

^r The President's budget request for Foster Care, Adoption Assistance, Guardianship Assistance, and Independent Living programs proposes an increase of \$250 million to support a reform agenda focused on improving outcomes for children.

^s The conference agreement includes \$20 million to fund demonstration projects that aim to improve the outcomes for children and families, particularly those with long-term involvement in foster care. The demonstration program will take a multi-faceted approach to reduce the number of children who stay in foster care for extended periods of time and encourage an upfront investment in evidence-based or evidence-informed services.

^t The FY 2010 HIV/AIDS and Chronic Diseases Prevention budget lines reflect a comparability adjustment to reflect the transfer of Division of Adolescent and School Health (DASH) budget (\$40 million) from Chronic Diseases Prevention to Domestic HIV/AIDS in FY 2012 budget request.

^u The President's budget request reflects an increase of \$69 million above the FY 2010 level, including \$30.4 million from the ACA Prevention and Public Health Fund and a transfer of \$40 million from the Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion budget for the Division of Adolescent and School Health (DASH).

^v The President's budget request consolidates this activity into the new Comprehensive Chronic Disease Prevention Program.

^w The conference agreement does not fund the President's FY10 budget request for the expansion of the CDC's safe motherhood program, which promotes evidence-based interventions for teen pregnancy prevention.

^x The FY 2012 request of \$55.7 million for Safe Motherhood reflects an increase of \$10.9 million above the FY 2010 level. A total of \$6.5 million of the increase is intended to increase support for teen pregnancy prevention activities, with a focus on evaluation.

^y Not subject to annual appropriations. ACA provides \$1.5 billion in mandatory funding for the program between FY 2010 and FY 2014, with \$100 million for 2010, \$250 million for FY 2011, and \$350 million for FY 2012.

^{aa} College- and Career-Ready grants are part of Title I grants to LEAS

^{bb} H.R. 1473 also applies an across-the-board cut of 0.2% which has been applied to this program, meaning an additional \$1.4 million has been deducted for an exact funding level of \$698.6 million.

^{cc} Past Race to the Top program funds were used to motivate states to reform their laws and make new plans to better support educational improvement and innovation. New funding would support awards to additional states and open the Race to the Top competition to school districts, allowing them to compete directly, with a particular focus on cost-effective reforms that improve student achievement.

^{dd} The Department of Education renamed the School Improvement Grant program to the School Turnaround Program for the FY 2011 budget.

^{ee} Of the \$108 million provided in the FY 2010 conference agreement, \$15 million is dedicated to transitional jobs activities.

^{ff} As provided under the Workforce Investment Act and the Second Chance Act of 2007, \$20 million of the \$90 million would be for competitive grants to national and regional intermediaries for activities that prepare young ex-offenders and school dropouts for employment, with a priority for projects serving high-crime, high-poverty areas.

^{gg} The House-passed version of the Student Aid and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 2009 includes a total of \$3 billion in mandatory funds over 5 years (\$600 million/year from FY 2010 to FY 2014) for this program. However, this was not included in the Health Care and Education Affordability Reconciliation Act of 2010, although this Act did include \$2 billion (\$500 million/year over four years) for a Community College and Career Training Grant program through the Department of Labor (see below).

^{hh} Although H.R. 1473 did not include funding for the College Access and Completion Fund, it did include \$150 million in funding for the College Access Challenge Grant Program. This program, which was first funded in 2008 as part of the Higher Education Act, was incorporated into the President's College Access and Completion Fund with the purpose of fostering partnerships among federal, state, and local governments and philanthropic organizations through grants aimed at increasing the number of low-income students who are prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education.

ⁱⁱ President's budget requests \$150 million for "First in the World" competition, an initiative to increase college access and completion and improve educational productivity through a new evidence-based grant program. The proposal introduces an evidence-based framework into the Fund for Improvement of Postsecondary Education, allowing the Fund to become a postsecondary "Investing in Innovation" program to test, validate, and scale up effective approaches.

^{jj} Not subject to annual appropriations. The House-passed version of the Student Aid and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 2009 includes a total of \$7 billion in mandatory funds over 10 years (\$730 million for each of the fiscal years 2010 through 2013, and \$680 million for each of the fiscal years 2014 through 2019) for this program. This was not included in the Health Care and Education Affordability Reconciliation Act of 2010, although this Act did include \$2 billion (\$500 million each year over four years) for a Community College and Career Training Grant program through the Department of Labor.

^{kk} Not subject to annual appropriations. This represents mandatory funding included in the Health Care and Education Affordability Reconciliation Act of 2010 for FY 2011-FY2014.
