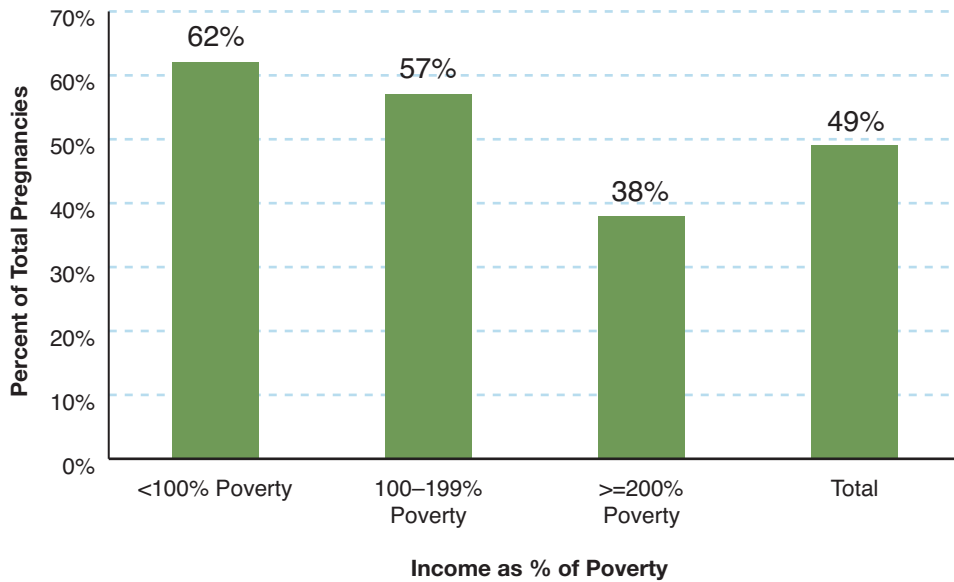


#### A-4. Percent of Pregnancies that are Unplanned by Income (as a % of Poverty), 2001<sup>5</sup>

- ▲ Among women with incomes less than 100 percent of the federal poverty threshold and incomes 100 to 199 percent of the federal poverty threshold, a majority of all pregnancies are unplanned. (Note that in 2007, the federal poverty threshold was defined as \$10,787 for one person under age 65 years<sup>6</sup>).
- ▲ Approximately four out of ten pregnancies among women with incomes equal to or greater than 200 percent of the federal poverty threshold are unplanned (38%).
